The Ostbayerische Technische Hochschule Amberg-Weiden issues the following statutes on the basis of Art. 3 para. sentence 2, Art. 58 para. sentence 1, Art. 61 para. 2 and 3 of the Bavarian Higher Education Act of 23 May 2006 (GVBI p. 245, BayRS 2210-1-1-WK) in the respective valid version of 9 May 2007 (GBVI p. 320) in the respective valid version:

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## Purpose of the study and examination regulations

These study and examination regulations serve to complete and supplement the Framework Examination Regulations for Universities of Applied Sciences in Bavaria (RaPO) of 17 October 2001 (GVBI p. 686) and the General Study and Examination Regulations of the Ostbayerische Technische Hochschule Amberg-Weiden of 27 May 2020, as amended.

#### § 2

#### Study objective

- (1) 1The aim of the programme is to provide prospective managers with the skills they need to act in an international and disruptive environment. 2 Graduates of the Master's degree programme should acquire a level of analytical, systemic thinking skills that goes beyond the typical Bachelor's degree programme and enable them to independently apply scientific knowledge and procedures to problems. <sup>3They</sup> should become familiar with the independent formulation and methodologically sound processing of current questions of research and practice as well as the critical analysis and reflection of scientific and practice-related knowledge. <sup>4With</sup> regard to the topic of international management and sustainability, they should in particular be able to deal productively with complexity and the clash of different stakeholder groups with potentially conflicting interests.
- (2) 1Building on an undergraduate degree in a business, social or cultural science subject, the course is designed to enable students to take on a leading role in groups or organisations and to promote the professional development of team members in a targeted manner. 2Students should learn to define goals independently, use suitable means to achieve them and accompany detailed project planning and implementation. 3One of the aims of the degree programme is to be able to recognise, assess and deal with opportunities and risks in an international corporate environment and in the area of corporate sustainability.
- (3) 1Students should also be enabled to represent their own or team work results in an intercultural environment by means of good communication skills in a sector-specific or cross-sectoral manner. <sup>2At</sup> the same time, students learn how to systematically consider the social, cultural, ecological and ethical effects of activities and decisions, subject them to critical reflection and incorporate them responsibly into their decisions and actions.
- (4) 1After completing their studies, students should be in a position to take on specialist and management tasks in companies and administration, to work as entrepreneurs or freelancers and to apply new scientific knowledge in practice in the future. <sup>2In</sup> addition to specialist skills, the degree programme should convey a love of learning and the creative application of knowledge, promote the ability to criticise and reflect and encourage an attitude of responsibility in the workplace and society.
- (5) <sup>1The</sup> skills acquired on the Master's degree programme in International Management & Sustainability qualify students to take on complex specialist and management tasks and can serve as a basis for academic qualification in a subsequent doctoral procedure or enable them to work in academic institutions. 2Students will <sup>also</sup> be able to transfer scientific findings to practice and make them accessible for application in companies.

#### § 3

## Study programme profile

The International Management & Sustainability degree programme is a consecutive Master's degree programme with a more application-oriented profile.

## § 4 Standard period of study, start and structure of the programme

- (1) The degree programme is offered as a full-time course.
- (2) The standard period of study is three semesters.
- (3) The Master's thesis is in the final semester of the full-time degree programme.
- (4) <sup>1The</sup> degree programme can be started in both the winter and summer semesters. <sup>2</sup> <sup>There is</sup> no entitlement to start the programme in every semester (e.g. if the number of qualified applicants is low).
- (5) Detailed information on the structure of the degree programme and the timetable (study plan) can be found in the module handbook.

#### § 5

### Qualification requirements

- (1) Qualification requirements for admission to the Master's degree programme in International Management & Sustainability are a successfully completed university degree comprising at least six theoretical semesters in a relevant degree programme or an equivalent degree, the scope of which generally comprises 210 ECTS credit points, but at least 180 ECTS credit points, proof of sufficient knowledge of the English language and a successful assessment of the programme-specific aptitude in accordance with § 6.
- (2) <sup>1The</sup> university degree according to para. 1 must be completed with an overall examination grade of "good" or better. 2If a conversion of the overall grade is required due to deviating grading systems, this is carried out according to the so-called "modified Bavarian formula" in accordance the general examination regulations of OTH Amberg-Weiden. 3An applicant with a degree from a foreign university is recommended to submit a letter of recognition of the degree issued by a certified institution (e.g. uni-assist) by the end of the application period. <sup>4The</sup> decision on admission to the degree programme is made by the Examination Board. 5The Examination Board may decide that the grade criterion specified in sentence 1 is deemed to have been met if the applicants concerned provide written proof that they are among the top 40 % of graduates of their degree programme in their final year; the sole criterion for comparison is the overall examination grade achieved in the final examination.
- (3) 1In addition to business-oriented degree programmes, relevant courses include in particular interdisciplinary degree programmes with elements from social or cultural science degree programmes (e.g. International Business, Applied Business Psychology, Trade and Service Management, International Technology Management) as well as technology-oriented degree programmes (e.g. Industrial Engineering, Media Informatics). <sup>2The</sup> examination board decides on the relevance of the course.

- (4) <sup>1</sup> Graduates of a Bachelor's degree programme with fewer than 210 (but at least 180) ECTS credits have the opportunity to provide evidence of missing theoretical competences by successfully completing modules from the undergraduate degree programme offered by the Ostbayerische Technische Hochschule Amberg-Weiden. 2lf credits are missing at the beginning of the degree programme, the Examination Board will determine the additional coursework and examinations that must be completed within one year of starting the degree programme. <sup>3Missing</sup> practical skills can demonstrated through practical professional activities that correspond to the requirements of the practical semester in the undergraduate degree programmes.
- (5) 1Applications for admission to the Master's degree programme for a course commencing in the summer semester must be submitted to the university by 15 January, for a course commencing in the winter semester by 15 July of the relevant year. 2The university may extend these deadlines if necessary.
- (6) <sup>1Applicants</sup> for the Master's degree programme who do not yet an overall examination result at the time of the application deadline for the Master's degree programme, but who can credibly demonstrate a successful first degree by the start of the Master's degree programme, will be admitted to the programme on condition that they provide the necessary evidence within one semester of commencing the Master's degree programme. 2Proof of the degree is provided by submitting proof of grades (e.g. transcript of records), which certifies that all coursework required for successful completion of the degree programme has been completed.
- (7) 1Sufficient knowledge of the English language must be demonstrated by a language certificate corresponding to level B2 according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. 2This proof can be provided by a valid / current IBT (Internet-Based Test) Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) with a score of at least 80, IELTS Cambridge Test with 6, the Test of English for International Communication (TOEIC) with a score of at least 780, or equivalent proof, e.g. through corresponding modules in the degree certificate. 3 Proof is not required if the university entrance qualification or high school diploma was obtained in English.
- (8) <sup>1In order to</sup> increase the chances of successful integration of students/graduates into the German labour market and to ensure the studyability of individual modules (e.g. preparation of the Master's thesis with an external institution, service learning module), applicants who have neither obtained a first degree nor a higher education entrance qualification in German must provide proof of sufficient knowledge of German at the beginning of their studies by means of a language certificate corresponding to level A2 according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. 2This proof can be provided by the certificate TELC (The European Language Certificate) German, Level A2, the Goethe-Zertifikat A2 or an equivalent certificate, e.g. ÖSD Zertifikat A2. 3During the Master's degree programme, German language skills must be extended to level B1 (e.g. through German courses, internships or self-study). Proof of German languages must be before registering for the Master's thesis.
- (9) <sup>11f</sup> applicants are not admitted, they will be informed of this in writing, stating the reasons. 2 <sup>A</sup> new application is only possible once and at the earliest in the following application period.

#### § 6

## Proof of aptitude for the specific degree programme

- (1) The prerequisite for participation in the aptitude test is the submission of the required application documents in due form and time and in full.
- (2) The application for participation in the aptitude assessment procedure is made at the same time as the application for admission to the degree programme and must be submitted to OTH Amberg-Weiden by the application deadlines specified in the study and examination regulations.
- (3) <sup>1The</sup> aptitude procedure provides for the successful submission of a written essay as proof of aptitude for the specific degree programme. 2The criteria for the essay are equally weighted towards the quality of the argumentation in relation to the subject areas mentioned in paragraph 3, as well as the formal quality of the argumentation in relation to the structures of scientific analysis and linguistic expression.

3The subject of the essay is the topic areas:

- 1. International Management,
- 2. Sustainable corporate management.

4The requirements for the essay are:

- The essay must be written in English and contain a minimum of 1000 and a maximum of 1500 words.
- The topic includes an analysis that requires a good basic knowledge of the topics mentioned.
- 1The processing time ends with the application deadlines specified in the study and examination regulations. 2The thesis must be uploaded as part of the online application process or sent to the study office in electronic form before the end of the processing period.
- Sources and aids consulted must be indicated.
- A form confirming that the essay was written independently must be enclosed.
- (4) 1A differentiated assessment with points is made on the basis of the results of the essay in accordance with paragraph 3 and the final grade of the first degree programme. A total of 100 points can be achieved, including 30 points from the first degree programme and up to 70 points from the essay. 2Passing the aptitude test requires at least 65 points. 3The final grade of the first degree programme is converted into points as follows: 40 points are for a grade of 4.0, 30 points are for a grade of 1.0. <sup>5For</sup> every tenth better than a grade of 4.0, 1 point is awarded.
- (5) <sup>1The</sup> selection procedure is carried out by a selection committee of at least two professors appointed by the faculty council of the respective faculty. 2The term of office of the members of the selection committee is three years; reappointment is permitted. 3The women's representative of the respective faculty may participate in the selection committee in an advisory capacity.
- (6) Proof of course-specific aptitude is provided for applicants who have completed their relevant first degree with an overall grade of "better than 1.3" or who are demonstrably among the top 10 % of graduates in their degree programme.

(7) <sup>11f</sup> the applicant fails the aptitude test, it is possible to apply again at a later date. <sup>2 A</sup> third application is excluded.

## § 7

#### Modules and certificates of achievement

- (1) The appendix to these study and examination regulations contains an overview of the modules, the type of courses, the credits to be achieved, the credit points awarded (ECTS points) and the weighting of the modules for the formation of the overall certificate grade as well as an overview of the types of courses and forms of examination used.
- (2) The modules are divided into compulsory and compulsory elective modules.
  - a) Compulsory modules are obligatory for all students.
  - b) Compulsory elective modules must be selected from a given range. They are treated like compulsory modules.
- (3) Detailed information on the modules as well as on the coursework and examinations and possibilities for acquiring bonus points for optional coursework are listed in the module handbook.
- (4) <sup>1There</sup> is no entitlement to all compulsory elective modules being offered. 2In the same way, there is no entitlement to courses being offered if there are not enough participants.

#### § 8

### Module handbook and curriculum

- (1) <sup>1The</sup> Faculty of Weiden Business School draws up a module handbook and a study plan to ensure the range of courses on offer and to inform students, from which the course of study and the content of the individual modules are derived. 2The module handbook shall be adopted by the Faculty Council and publicised at the University. 3The announcement of new regulations must be made at the latest at the beginning of the lecture period of the semester in which the regulations are applied for the first time.
- (2) <sup>1The</sup> modules and the associated coursework and examinations are described in the module handbook. 2The module handbook contains in particular the following information on the individual modules:
  - a) Name/description of the module (German/English)
  - b) Frequency of the offer
  - c) ECTS credit points (incl. distribution of the workload)
  - d) Teachers/module leaders
  - e) Admission requirements
  - f) Learning objectives
  - g) Teaching content
  - h) Study and examination achievements
  - i) the language of instruction and examination in the individual modules (English or German)
  - j) Applicability in the further course of study or university-wide.
- (3) <sup>1The</sup> course of study is described in the curriculum. 2The curriculum contains the following information:

- a) Timing of the programme, chronological order of the modules
- b) Number of attendance hours (SWS) per module
- c) ECTS credit points per module

### § 9

#### Assessment of examinations and performance records

- (1) If the coursework and examinations of a module specified in the module handbook are assessed with an overall grade of "sufficient" or better, the credit points for the module are awarded and the coursework and examinations of the module count as successfully completed.
- (2) The overall grade is calculated as the weighted average of the individual module grades with the weights specified in the appendix.

### § 10

### Examination board

The examination board responsible for the degree programme is the examination board of the Weiden Business School faculty with a chairperson and two further members appointed by the faculty council.

## § 11

### Master thesis

- (1) The Master's thesis is the academic final thesis that demonstrates that students can work on an academic issue and present it appropriately.
- (2) 1The prerequisite for registering for the Master's thesis and receiving a topic is that students have achieved at least 30 credit points each and that proof of German language proficiency at level B1 according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages is presented if neither a first degree nor the higher education entrance qualification was obtained in German. <sup>2Students</sup> who have not received a topic despite their own efforts will be assigned a task setter by the examination board upon request.
- (3) The Master's thesis can be registered and the topic issued at the beginning of the second semester at the earliest and should take place in the first month of the third semester at the latest to ensure an ideal course of study.
- (4) 1The processing time for the Master's thesis is six months. 2lt can be extended by two months by the examination board if the reasons for the extension are not the responsibility of the respective student.
- (5) <sup>1The</sup> Master's thesis must be written in English. <sup>2It</sup> may be written in German with the authorisation of the supervisor.

## § 12 Academic degree

- (1) The degree programme is successfully completed when all coursework and examinations have been successfully completed.
- (2) The academic degree "Master of Arts", abbreviated to "M.A.", is awarded on successful completion of the programme.

## § 13 Entry into force

These study and examination regulations come into force on the day after they are published and apply to students commencing their studies in the winter semester 2021/22 or later.
